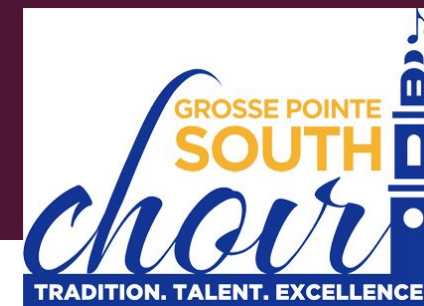

A BRIEF HISTORY OF SHOW CHOIR (READER'S DIGEST VERSION)

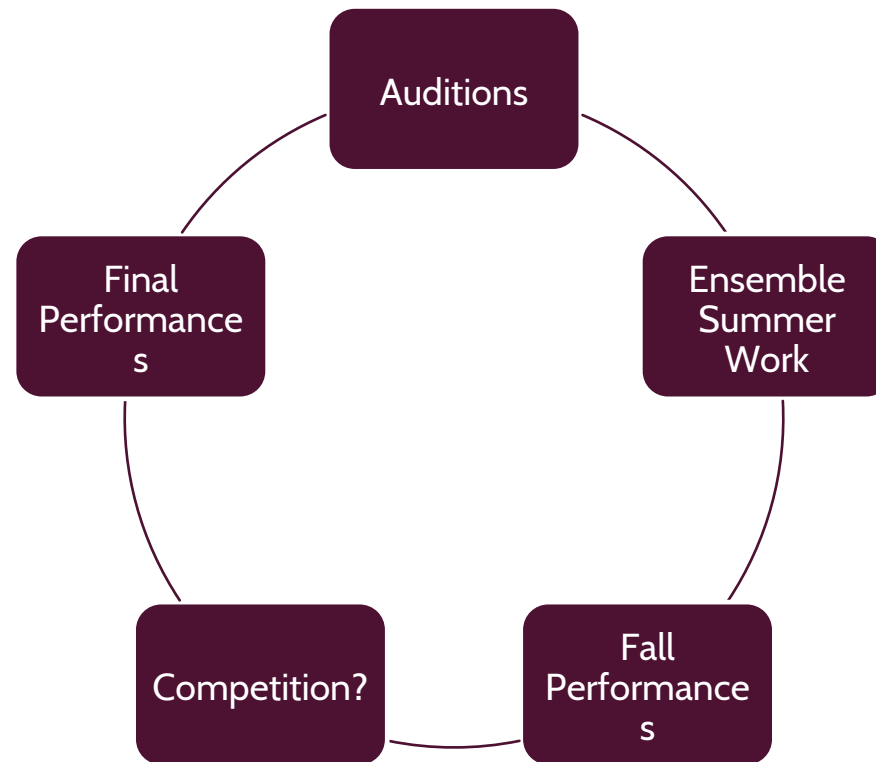

- Four choirs, one extra-curricular a cappella ensemble that specialize in a variety of choral genres including show, concert/classical and jazz.
 - 2 varsity show choirs that compete in show choir invitationals usually in February and March.

- Participate in Solo and Ensemble Districts and State competitions
- Host MSVMA East site for Musical Theatre Solo and Ensemble

SUCCESSFUL SHOW CHOIRS SHARE...

- A Culture of Team Work
 - Between students, but also the staff: your key people
 - *Example:* Director, Arranger, Accompanist, Choreographer, Secretary/Assistant, Instrumentalists.
 - Parents and booster support group to assist in key positions, like costuming, technical needs, raising funds
- Items to support productions
 - Risers, costumes, number line, appropriate props: ability to find those, make-up, hair
- Advocacy
- Style and Brand

ARRANGEMENTS

- “Stock” (published) arrangements – these are published by mainstream publishers (Hal Leonard, Alfred, etc.)
 - Typical instrumentation – 2 trumpets, woodwind, trombone, synthesizer, electric guitar, electric bass, drum set
- Custom arrangements – a large amount of music used by competitive show choirs are custom arrangements (written specifically for the group performing the selection). Choral voicing, instrumentation, level of difficulty, and form can be tailored to your specific ensemble. If you wish to use custom arrangements, some things to consider:
 - Copyright – you **MUST** get permission to arrange any song. Tresóna Music (www.tresonamusic.com) holds the rights to MANY published songs and administrates the licensing. Penalties can be extremely stiff if this step isn’t taken.
 - When arranging, care should be given to vocal ranges of the ensemble (if the original key of a given song doesn’t work for your group, the key should be changed) as well as when instruments are playing (when singers are singing, wind instruments should be tacet – one trumpet can play louder than 50 singers – they can “play out” during introductions, transitions, and dance sections, as well as playing “punctuation”)
